


Message from the Chief Executive Althea Loderick

Newham's Children's Services are showing positive signs of improvement and have delivered a well-coordinated response to the Covid-19 pandemic, according to Ofsted.

The children's services watchdog paid a three-day "focused visit" to Newham at the end of October. Inspectors explored work across children's social care services, including key decision making in help and protection, children in care and services for care leaves. They also took a close look at how the council has worked with schools and health services to meet the needs of vulnerable children during the pandemic.

Ofsted found lots of examples of improvement, and also highlighted areas where further progress is still needed.

The findings are a great step forward and testament to all the hard work and dedication of staff in Children's Services.

New Tier-2 Rules



The government has replaced the current Covid-19 guidelines with an updated tiers system, with different levels of restrictions in different parts of the country.

Newham has been placed in Tier 2, with the new rules coming into effect from the beginning of Wednesday 2 December.

New Tier 2 rules

- Meeting friends and family: You must NOT mix with other households indoors
- Support bubbles for people who live alone and single parents with children can continue
- You can meet up to 5 other people maximum of 6 in a group including yourself outdoors, including public outdoor spaces
- All pubs and restaurants must close, unless they are operating as restaurants
- Hospitality businesses and venues selling takeaway food and drink can continue to do so after 10pm as long as this is through delivery, click-and-collect or drive-through.
- Non-essential shops including retail, entertainment, accommodation, personal care (hairdressers, beauty salons, and nail bars) and indoor leisure centres can open

New Tier-2 Rules - continued



- Children can continue to move between homes if their parents are separated
- Schools, universities and places of worship remain open
- Weddings and funerals can go ahead with restrictions on the number of attendees. 15 people can attend wedding ceremonies and receptions, 30 people can attend funeral ceremonies, and 15 people can attend linked commemorative events such as wakes or stone settings
- Aim to reduce the number of journeys you make. If you need to travel, you should walk, drive or cycle where possible, or plan ahead and avoid busy times and routes on public transport
- Avoid travelling into tier 3 areas (except where necessary)
- Continue to work from home if you can
- Spectator sports, theatre and entertainment will be allowed to resume both indoors and outdoors, but with limited numbers and social distancing in place
- For outdoors, 2,000 people (or 50% of usual capacity, whichever is lower) will be allowed to attend in tier 2. Indoors, the limit is 1,000 people.

Christmas Covid-19 rules



During the Christmas period, some Covid-19 restrictions will be eased. When following these new rules, please continue to take personal responsibility to limit the spread of the virus and protect our loved ones, particularly if they are vulnerable, by following the general guidance – hands, face, space here. For many, this will mean that it is not possible to celebrate Christmas in the way you normally would.

- Between 23 and 27 December 2020:
- you can form an exclusive 'Christmas bubble' composed of people from no more than three households
- your Christmas bubble replaces any existing bubble you are part of, unless your entire existing bubble is part of your Christmas bubble
- you can only be in one Christmas bubble
- you cannot change your Christmas bubble

Christmas Covid-19 rules - continued



- you can travel between tiers and UK nations for the purposes of meeting your Christmas bubble
- you can only meet your Christmas bubble in private homes or in your garden, places of worship, or public outdoor spaces
- you can continue to meet people who are not in your Christmas bubble outside your home, in accordance to the rules in tier 2 and following social distancing guidelines here
- you cannot meet someone in a private dwelling who is not part of your household or Christmas bubble
- you should not join a Christmas bubble if you are self-isolating. If someone tests positive, or develops coronavirus symptoms up to 48 hours after the Christmas bubble last met, everyone will have to self-isolate.

National and local status



The number of infections recorded as of **2pm on 9 December 2020**:

- 1,750,241 cases of coronavirus have been confirmed.
- There have been 62,033 **deaths*** in the UK. Of those 269* were in Newham.
- Newham has had 8,282 positive cases since the start of pandemic.

Hands. Face. Space.



- Remember the basics Hands. Face. Space.
- Staying home is key: If you have symptoms isolate for 10 days. Do this until you have a
 negative test. If you live with someone or have had close contact with someone who has
 symptoms you need to isolate for 14 days, having your own test, unfortunately, doesn't make
 a difference as you may still be incubating the virus. Only if the person who had symptoms is
 negative can you stop isolating.
- Stay 2m away from people you don't live with; wash your hands regularly; wear a facecovering inside and outside if you can't stay 2m from people.
- Ask for help when you need it: isolating is hard, particularly when we've just started to come back into seeing people. And limiting who we see is hard. Newham's COVID-19 help line remains open 1pm-7pm, 7 days a week on 0207 473 9711 (1-7pm, 7 days a week).





- With the number of new Covid-19 cases on the rise both in Newham and nationally, it is vital
 that everyone that does access our offices or other work sites follows all of Newham's
 workforce social distancing protocols.
- Staff are to maintain the 2 metre distancing rule at all times (wherever practically possible) when working in any Council building.
- We have increased cleaning regimes & improved access to sanitisers & wipes: please use these to minimise the risk of infection.
- Only one person is allowed in a lift at any one time enclosed spaces increase the risk of infection.
- Staff are to use stairs to go down & elevators to go up floors (unless they cannot use stairs).
- Some of desks have been closed off to enable staff to maintain social distancing, Only use desks identified as being available to use.
- Any one-way building circulation advice and meeting room capacities should be strictly followed.
- You should make increased use of the hand sanitisers and desk wipes that have been made available at our open sites.
- Strictly follow any advice on face coverings or personal protective equipment that you have been issued with in relation to your particular role.

Testing



- If you have symptoms, stay home for 10 days and to try and get a test if you can.
- If you are worried about your symptoms please call NHS 111 or your GP.
- The walkthrough test site in East Ham is currently seeing high demand so you should not attend without a booked test (as you may not be able to get a test as a walk-up).
- If you live with someone who has symptoms you need to stay home for 14 days.
- If you have been in close contact with someone who has received a positive test or has symptoms, stay home for 14 days.
- If you develop symptoms during isolation, try to get a test and stay home.
- Please do not get tested if you have no symptoms.
- The new NHS Test and Trace App is an additional tool that you can use to help keep yourself safe and stop the spread of the virus. www.newham.gov.uk/testandtrace
