

Newham have asked us to conduct this study to better understand the housing design needs of residents who are neurodivergent, residents with autism, residents with learning disabilities and their families

Key aims and outputs:

- To produce an evidence-base of the Housing design needs of neurodivergent residents and residents with autism
- To co-produce a 'Housing Design guide' with key stakeholders to promote betterdesigned housing for residents







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Jan Healy & Marney Walker

- 1. Stakeholder engagement
- Conducting workshops with a range of professionals and services that support and work with these residents
- Attending resident advisory groups to hear their experiences and views about the housing design needs of this population
- Visiting new build developments and regeneration projects

- 2. Collaborating with key stakeholders
- Focus groups and interviews will be conducted to explore what the key housing design needs are for these residents
- Collecting data on design needs from residents, families, care and support services, agencies and professionals
- Co-production of a housing design guide for residents who are neurodivergent and residents with autism

- There is a form to fill in you can just walk into the building and do

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



Findings: Physical Health

- Experiences of interactions between autism and physical ageing
- Fears of autism as a riskfactor for age-related illness
- Autism can make it more difficult to engage in preventative health behaviours

'Menopause can be particularly destabilising for autistic women compared with neurotypical women. **If I'd known** that I maybe would have been able to ride it out better.'

'I think there's an increased possibility of dementia [...] for people that have got autism. And, okay, that's going to be horrible if it happens. But at least **if I know** there's a possibility it might happen, I can be looking out for the signs [...] not in a negative way, [but] in a practical way. [...] I can start doing the things that might help

'Inertia can be a theme for autistic people.'



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• Ageing & Autism - Manchester Study Findings

Findings : Age-Related Changes

- Some aspects of autism became more challenging with age
- Changes in ability to 'mask' autistic characteristics
- Concerns around changes in caring responsibilities

'I think the [sensory] triggers get worse. What I wouldn't necessarily notice so much as a young person, I'm now immediately screaming in my head.'

'You know, we still have the same problems and issues we might be better controlling them or managing them or masking them.'

'As you get older, the question of just the amount of energy you have to be able to do the masking'

'My mother's part of my support network [...] And I know it's something that everybody gets to in middle age, to worry about the parents [...] and what they're gonna do about their care. And I think that's magnified to some extent with autism, because I know that I could not go and stay at hers and look after her'.



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• Ageing & Autism - Manchester Study Findings

Findings : Social Support

with other people'

- Difficulties in building supportive social networks
- Increased reliance on family for social support
- 'A lot of autistic people end up staying at home with their parents'

'I take care of myself. I generally have difficulty dealing

 Autism as a risk factor for social isolation in later life

'Older people tend to progressively lose out on social contact. And if you if you've had a fairly low level of social contact to start with, which autistic people probably do, then it may be more important to retain what little I do have.'



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Findings: Knowledge and Attitudes

happen as they get older.'

- A need for more knowledge about ageing with autism
- A lack of older autistic 'role models'.

'There are not very many over 50s who even have diagnoses and very few over 70. So how are we even supposed to know what happens when we get older?'

'Autistic people do need to know what's going to

 Need for greater knowledge and understanding of autism within services

'We can, well, be seen as difficult clients, which might reduce the quality of the support we get.'



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Findings: Seeking Formal Support

 Barriers to accessing support 'Executive functioning and my ability to engage with the world really fluctuates so that when I'm overwhelmed, I lose a bit of speech.'

 Many health and social care services are not suitable for autistic people '[My GP] have the radio and it's just a massive trigger. And then there are kids they're running around and screeching and banging on the toys. [...] We cannot seek the health care that we need because seeking it is worse than any illness.'

'One of my worst nightmares is ending up in an old people's home because I have these sensory processing difficulties. So being in an overheated room that's far too warm with a lot of other people with a TV up turned over full blast [...] is literally one of my worst nightmares.'


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• Ageing & Autism - Manchester Study Findings

The SPACE Framework e.g. Doherty et al (2023)

- Sensory Needs
- Predictability
- Acceptance
- Communication
- Empathy



Autistic Spaces are events/places where autistic needs have been considered.
