Industrial uses are essential to the country's functioning economy and particulary that within LBN where industrial uses provide a significant number of jobs. SEGRO has published a report titled 'Keep London Working' that sets out research into the London employment market and highlights the vital role industrial land has in the capital's future economic and population growth. Therefore, SEGRO recommend that the Vision more clearly outlines LBN's approach to protecting and promoting new industrial uses in the wider context of economic growth for the borough and supporting functions for new residential development. The economic objectives (no. 2, p19) should specifically refer to the protection and growth of industrial uses.	This wording change has not been made. We did not consider this change to be necessary as the vision and objective 2 already address the importance of a range of employment land and provision. This includes industrial land.
